


ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

FIRST READING ISAIAH 40:1-5, 9-11

God loves us very much. This message from God, given by Isaiah to the people of Israel, is meant for us too. God wants to comfort and look after us. God is like a shepherd, feeding his lambs, holding

them close to his heart. This is great news! We can be proud of our God and let everyone know just how much God cares for us. It doesn't matter what we may have done wrong, God will give us a second chance.

SECOND READING 2 PETER 3:8-14

We might get impatient for God to act in the world. But, as we are reminded in this reading, God's time is not ours: a day can be like a thousand years and a thousand years like a day. We can be sure

that God will come and will make the world new again. In the meantime, we can live as God asks. If we follow Jesus' example and are loving, then we will be peaceful and ready to meet God.

GOSPEL MARK 1:1-8

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

Right at the beginning of his Gospel, Mark wants us to know that Jesus is Good News! Jesus is the promised saviour who will bring us all new life. Jesus is the Son of God, spoken of by the prophet Isaiah in our first reading. Jesus will fulfil all the hopes of the prophets.

John the Baptist is God's messenger, preparing everyone for the saviour. Jesus is going to put right our relationship with God. Each of us has the opportunity now to make a new start and turn towards God, just as the people listening to John did.





FIRST READING ISAIAH 61:1-2, 10-11

Imagine what it would be like to be locked away in prison – and then suddenly being given your freedom! This is one of the images Isaiah uses to explain the real joy that knowing God brings. God's love will heal hearts that are broken and

give new life to the most desolate. Isaiah proclaims a "year of favour" when debts will be forgotten, so that no one will be burdened by money troubles. Belonging to God really is good news and worth celebrating!

SECOND READING 1 THESSALONIANS 5:16-24

GOSPEL JOHN 1:6-8. 19-28

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St John.

John was sent by God to prepare everyone for Jesus, the Messiah. Although people misunderstood, John's message is very clear. Someone much more important and much more special than him, is coming. Like a witness in court, John is cross examined by people

who want to find the truth. He is not afraid to speak God's message. He is a prophet, making sure we are listening to what God wants to say. Jesus is God's word, the light who will bring hope and joy to us all. Rooted in God's promise, John asks us all to be ready to welcome the light.



countries Christmas is celebrated on 6 January. This is because some Eastern Orthodox churches use a different calendar, the Julian calendar, for liturgy,

while in the west we use the Gregorian calendar. In some non-Christian countries. Christmas is

not a holiday at all.

FIRST READING 2 SAMUEL 7:1-5. 8-12. 14. 16

God loves his people very much. Since the very beginning, they have had a covenant relationship: God will be with them, and they will live as God asks. Here, through the prophet Nathan, God makes a covenant with David. God chose David

and has always been with him, from shepherd boy to powerful king. Now God promises that all David's descendants will enjoy this special relationship. God does not need a house; God will live in the House, the family, of David.



GOSPEL LUKE 1:26-38


The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Luke.

So much news in such a short time! The angel Gabriel brings a very special message to Mary: God is with her and she is going to have a baby, called Jesus, who will rule over the people and his kingdom will have no end. Mary's son will fulfil God's promise

to David in our first reading. God's chosen saviour will be born into the House of King David. Mary's cousin Elizabeth is also pregnant – despite thinking she was too old to have a baby. Nothing is impossible for God. In this moment, Mary gives her whole life to God.



FIRST READING GENESIS 15:1-6; 21:1-3

God speaks to Abraham in a vision and makes the most amazing promise. Abraham will have as many descendants as there are stars in the sky. This would be an incredible idea for anyone, but for Abraham

it is especially amazing, as he doesn't have even one child. Yet God keeps his promise to Abraham. Abraham's wife gives birth to a baby boy whom they name Isaac. Abraham is still remembered as the "Father of many nations."

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. God promises Abraham he will have many descendants.

SECOND READING HEBREWS 11:8. 11-12. 17-19

Abraham had amazing faith in God. He left his home to go to a new country because he trusted in God's promise. Despite being childless, Abraham trusted God when he was told that he would have as many descendants as the stars

in the sky. Abraham's wife Sarah trusted in God's promise that she would have a baby, even though she was past the age when it was possible for her to conceive. We look to Abraham and Sarah as role models in faith.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

DO YOU KNOW?

On Monday 28 December we celebrate the feast of The Holy Innocents, Martyrs. We remember those killed by Herod when he felt threatened by the new baby king, Jesus. We pray especially for all the children who are suffering and who may die in conflict today.

GOSPEL LUKE 2:22-40

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Luke.

Having a new baby is a learning experience for all parents, but Mary and Joseph have such a lot to find out! Their trip to the Temple to dedicate their baby to God should have been straightforward. However, Mary and Joseph are met by the holy man Simeon who recognises that Jesus is

the Messiah, the saviour promised by God. He holds the baby Jesus in his arms, praises God and blesses the young parents. While Mary and Joseph are trying to understand what is happening, the holy woman Anna arrives. Then Anna also praises God for this baby who will save Israel.


